KEY TRUTH:

THE GOAL OF ALL GRACE-GIFTS IS TO BUILD UP THE CHURCH.

• DISCUSSION POINT ONE: WHY ARE THE GRACE-GIFTS GIVEN?

In order to keep clearly in mind God's purpose for the grace-gifts, review 1 Corinthians 12:7. What purpose does this verse make very clear?

As you look further into that chapter, how does the idea of our being diverse parts of a unified body help to understand God's purpose for each one of us?

What is the common theme throughout 1 Cor. 14:3-5?

What perspective should we keep in any discussion about any particular gift?

DISCUSSION POINT TWO: THE ISSUE OF "TONGUES":

Look at the first reference in the Bible to a supernatural gift of "tongues" in Acts 2:1-13.

Remember that this was the Jewish Feast of Weeks, 33 AD, which we refer to as "Pentecost".

What had happened just 50 days prior?

What foreign-language speakers were probably present in Jerusalem for that event and were now there for the Feast? Look at Acts 2:9-11.

Given the political/religious views in Jerusalem at that time, what do you suppose these folks thought about Jesus?

Look at the statement in 1 Cor. 1:22. What was it going to take to get the attention of these Jews, foreign or otherwise?

By the way, remember that Paul, the author of this letter, was a foreign Jew himself, a Roman citizen who probably spoke Latin, Greek, Hebrew, and Aramaic.

According to Acts 2:5-6, what were these visitors hearing?

So how powerful a "sign" was it that these visitors suddenly were drawn to a group of "Galileans" (hillbillies)? Acts 2:6-8.

What gift does the Apostle Paul refer to most in 1 Cor. 13 and 14? What appears to have been going on at the church in Corinth?

What does Paul state about the gift of "tongues" in 1 Cor. 14:22? What is that gift's stated purpose?

Note that in several modern languages, the word for "Language" is "Tongue". This is also true of the Greek language of the New testament.

Here is some fun language stuff:

How would you say, "HI, HOW ARE YOU?" in ...

Spanish: "Que tal? Como te vá?" (Kay tahl? Como tay vah?)

Literally, "How are things? How does it go with you?"

French: "Comment ça va?" (Cohmment sah vah?)

Literally, "How does it go with you?"

German: "Hallo, wie geht's dir?) (Allo, vee gates deer?)

Literally, "Hello, how does it go with you?"

Russian: "Привет, как дела?" (Pree-viet, kahk dee-lah?)

Literally, "Greetings, (or Hi), how are things?"

<u>Hebrew</u>: "שלום! מה נשמע" (Shalom! Ma nishmá?)

Literally, "Peace, (or Hi), how is your spirit?"

in other words, How are you?

Greek: "γεια πως εισαι?" (Geeáh, pohs éesay?)

Literally, "Hello, how are you?"

What a variety! It is interesting that all the above languages except for Hebrew are from the same family of languages as our English.

DISCUSSION POINT THREE: PROPHECY.

What was the purpose of the gift of prophecy, as stated in 1 Cor. 14:1-6? Remembering that the New Testament did not yet exist yet, how did prophecy help build up the church?

By way of contrast, what did the gift of tongues accomplish?

What key point does the Apostle make in v. 12?

But what if there is an unbeliever sitting in your church meeting?

How should we use these two gifts, as instructed in verses 26-33?

What is the bottom line?

What are all gifts to accomplish?

Persecuted Believers:

Let's not forget to uphold our fellow believers around the world who are experiencing real and intense persecution for following Jesus.

THIS WEEK:

1. Egypt:

Kamel, a Christian man in Egypt's North Sinai region, was shot to death by Islamic extremists on Feb. 23 in front of his family, making him the seventh Christian to be martyred in the past month.

Pray for Kamel's wife and children as well as the other Christians who have lost family members.

2. Laos:

In early February, four Christian families were forced out of their village, upon threat of being beaten, because of their faith in Christ.

Because of sick family members, they are staying near a medical facility under plastic tarps.

Though they have nowhere to sleep, no food and no money, they want to remain faithful to the Lord.

3. India

Pastor Ramesh Patel and his wife were holding a prayer meeting on Dec. 20 at the home of a 60-year-old woman named Santhayama when a group of Hindu radicals raided the home. They beat the pastor, accusing him of forced conversions, tore off his clothes and dragged both him and the elderly woman to the police station where the pastor and the woman were arrested.

Though now released, they and the pastor's family are living in fear of new attacks.

4. Nigeria

Attacks continue on Christians in Kaduna state despite calls for peace and an increased army presence.

On the morning of Feb. 20, Fulani herdsmen began setting fire to Christians' homes and demanding that they renounce their faith. Gunmen killed 15 people, mostly women and children, and injured more than 50 others.

Uphold these fellow believers who are truly under fire.

5. Pakistan:

Asia Bibi, for whom many of us have prayed, was arrested in 2009. She now has one final appeal.

She has been in jail for more than seven years, separated by walls and bars from her husband and daughters. She has been threatened in jail, and must often cook her own food as a precaution against the

possibility of poisoning, yet she has tenaciously held onto her faith in Christ.
