Key Truth in this Psalm: PRESCRIPTION FOR A GOOD NIGHT'S SLEEP: CONFESS SIN, ACCEPT GOD'S FORGIVENESS, TRUST GOD WITH YOUR BATTLES.

DISCUSSION POINT ONE: CONSEQUENCES.

For background on this Psalm, read 2 Samuel 12:8-14.

What were David's sins as listed here?

What was David's response to being confronted? (2 Samuel 12:13)

Psalm 51 records David's confession in detail.

What was God's answer to David's confession? (2 Samuel 12:13)

Note that "taken away" here is literally "removed".

Compare Proverbs 24:23b-24 and Prov. 17:15 with the idea of forgiveness.

How can God remove sin and still be righteous and just?

Can you quote verses to prove this?

When God forgave David, what did He also say about the consequences David would have to experience?

DISCUSSION POINT TWO: CONFESSION.

What does confession of sin really accomplish?

David was being told by others that there was no forgiveness possible for him, but what does Psalm 3:3-6 indicate?

How does this match God's response in 2 Samuel 12:13?

What was the effect of being forgiven, even though David knew that there would be terrible consequences?

Remember 1 John 1:9? What do you learn from 1 John 1:5-10?

What do 1 John 1:7 and 9 say about the effect of confession on our relationships <u>both</u> with each other and with God?

DISCUSSION POINT THREE: TRUST.

So, I have sinned, I have confessed both to God and to someone I have offended, now – how does the idea of trusting God apply?

Where does peace come from?

Hindu Nirvana tries to achieve peace by achieving nothingness.

How different is the peace of God? Compare John 14:27.

How am I do deal with someone who holds a grudge against me or even tries to harm me as a result of my sin?

Read and think about Proverbs 28:13.

The prophet Micah had to deal with a very unrepentant Israel.

God had made specific promises (and curses) to Israel about the consequences of obeying or disobeying Him.

Read Micah's perspective on trusting God in Micah 7:7-10 and 18-19.

THIS WEEK:

1. <u>Sudan:</u> Three weeks after an elder was killed in an attack on church property in Sudan's historical city of Omdurman, a mob

<u>accompanied by police</u> ransacked the living quarters of the compound guard and arrested his family.

On April 24th, the mob demolished part of the room where the family lived, after first destroying its padlock at the compound of the Sudan Presbyterian Evangelical Church. The officers then took 27-year-old Mona Matta <u>and</u> her children, ages 2, 4 and 6, wife of guard Azhari Tambra (who was not home at the time of the attack), from their room at the church compound and detained them for 12 hours.

Mona and the three children, including one who is disabled, were accused of opposing authorities, lacking ownership papers and betraying their country. When they returned home after being released later that night, they found their home and belongings destroyed. Mona, Azhari and their children, members of a church in Omdurman, are still in need of permanent shelter.

Pray that they will find housing and that their faith will grow as a result of persecution.

2. <u>"Middle East":</u> Pray for Fadi, a Former Muslim Now Following Christ.

Pastor "Abraham" works in an area with a high concentration of Syrian refugees. He often struggled with fear when sharing the gospel with Muslims, but then he had an experience where the Lord told him not to fear.

Soon after that, "Fadi," a Syrian man who once associated with extremist Muslims, came to see him.

When he arrived at Abraham's home, Abraham boldly told Fadi that Islam was inspired by Satan. Abraham then walked closer to him and said, "God is here beside you now. He is putting his hand on your shoulder, asking you, 'What do you want?'"

"I want salvation," Fadi answered.

Abraham shared the gospel with Fadi and prayed with him.

He soon came to faith in Christ, and four months ago Abraham baptized Fadi. Fadi and his wife, also now a Christian, share God's love in their refugee camp.

Pray that Fadi's powerful testimony will draw many Muslims, including other extremists, into a relationship with Jesus. Pray that the hearts of Muslims will soften as Fadi, his wife and Abraham share the gospel.

3. <u>Nigeria:</u> Boko Haram terrorists ordered Habila and his family out of their home in northern Nigeria at gunpoint. Then they told Habila to

recite the Islamic creed, leave Christianity behind and become a Muslim.

"I am a Christian — and will always remain a Christian — even to death," Habila replied. The Boko Haram terrorists looked at his wife and asked why her husband was so stubborn. Then they shot Habila in the face and left him for dead, <u>but miraculously</u> he survived. When he shares his amazing testimony today, he also shares that he's forgiven the men who shot him, leaving him permanently disfigured.

"We are all condemned criminals," he says. "Jesus died for us. He loves us. That's why we must show that love to the people who hate us."
