Psalm 65

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Key Truth in this Psalm: Staying mindful and grateful to God our Provider.

• <u>DISCUSSION POINT ONE: BEING GRATEFUL FOR GOD'S PROVISION.</u> LEVITICUS 23:9-14 – CELEBRATION OF FIRST HARVEST

⁹Then the Lord said to Moses, ¹⁰ "Give the following instructions to the people of Israel. When you enter the land I am giving you and you harvest its first crops, bring the priest a bundle of grain from the first cutting of your grain harvest. ¹¹ On the day after the Sabbath, the priest will lift it up before the Lord so it may be accepted on your behalf. ¹² On that same day you must sacrifice a one-year-old male lamb with no defects as a burnt offering to the Lord. ¹³ With it you must present a grain offering consisting of four quarts* of choice flour moistened with olive oil. It will be a special gift, a pleasing aroma to the Lord. You must also offer one quart* of wine as a liquid offering. ¹⁴ Do not eat any bread or roasted grain or fresh kernels on that day until you bring this offering to your God. This is a permanent law for you, and it must be observed from generation to generation wherever you live.¹

How would you feel if you did something kind for someone and then they did not show the least thankfulness?

How can we go about staying aware that it is God who makes possible all that we are and have?

Read through Psalm 65 with these ideas in mind.

Look at the second part of verse 3. How does this relate to earning God's favor?

What might have caused David to stick that thought into the Psalm?

How do verses 5-8 strike you?

How do these verses affect your ideas of Who God Is?

What might cause us to take God for granted?

What could we do to prevent that?

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• <u>DISCUSSION POINT THREE: DEPENDENCE ON GOD.</u>

Imagine being a farmer – or maybe you already <u>are</u> one. In spite of irrigation, how important is the weather to us?

Side note:

Our company has a customer that actually modifies weather (cloud seeding). Recently one of their customers was Saudi Arabia. Guess what the Saudis learned? You can't make it rain if there are no clouds or moisture in the air!!!

Read verses 9-13 thinking about the importance of God's provision of rain.

What in your life would be the equivalent of a farmer's rain?

How about your paycheck? What is God's involvement with that?

Discuss some ways in which we can show thankfulness to God.

What about when we are struggling with paying the bills?

Does God really care?

What effect does trusting God have on us even when we are having problems and do not see a way out?

Say I am having a terrible time: Is it all about me?

How much are <u>you</u> willing to suffer in order for your neighbor to be drawn to Jesus?

What might be some other reasons that God would not "fix it all up"?

HERE IS ANOTHER THOUGHT:

There is a pervasive false thought that "Faith" is a <u>feeling</u> which we need to work up in order to have God answer prayers.

What IS 'Faith"?

How does Hebrews 11:1 shed light on this?

In Matt. 9:27-28, what did Jesus ask the blind men? Look at the words carefully. Did He ask if they believed that they <u>would be</u> healed? What was the specific question? How does that relate to <u>faith</u>?

FOR COGITATION:

What are some ways you can lead your family to remain aware of God's faithfulness?

What actions can we take to keep this perspective?

THIS WEEK:

1. <u>Uzbekistan:</u> Praise: Prisoner for Christ recently released after being arrested in 2007.

You may wonder if the letters you write on Prisoner Alert really do make a difference for our brothers and sisters in prison.

Recently a former prisoner for Christ, Dmitry "David" Shestakov, visited VOM's office and testified what a difference your letters made "a huge impact" while he was in prison in Uzbekistan. <u>Letters even</u> saved him from being beaten by the guards!

2. China: Praise: other prisoners for Christ recently released!

After nearly two years in prison, Christian human rights lawyer Li Heping returned home to his family earlier this month.

Li was arrested in July 2015, along with a group of other attorneys, for defending evangelical believers and others targeted by the government. Li was convicted of "subversion of state power" in a secret trial and was tortured repeatedly during his two-year imprisonment.

His brother, Li Chunfu, who was arrested at the same time, was so tormented in prison that he was released early after showing signs of mental illness.

Li himself is weak and thin, but his wife reports that he is in good spirits and was delighted to reunite with his family on May 9.

Many human rights lawyers in China are Christians who act out of personal conviction, which often puts them at odds with government authorities.

Pray that Li Heping and his brother, Li Chunfu, will be fully restored to health.

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3. India: Persecution for leaving a traditional religion.

"Shahri's" husband was among the first in his tribal group to accept Jesus. Although <u>his family were members of the priest caste</u> in their animistic religion, he came to know Christ and soon started a small church in their village.

He was threatened and beaten many times by local communist rebels, who <u>ultimately murdered him</u> at his home because of his Christian faith.

His wife, Shahri, has taken over the leadership of their church but faces many difficulties.

Her late husband's brother is threatening to take their home, and she is also struggling to pay for her four children's education.

Pray that Shahri's family can stay in their house and that her brother-in-law will turn from hate and come to know Jesus.
